CHAIR'S REVIEW



What a great year for baseball in WA.

As reported last year the board in continuing to focus on grass roots participation, club health, diversity, facilities and high-performance programs. The Board continues to work on these to grow and support the game in WA.

As part of our goal to provide a first-class facility, the netting at Empire Ballpark been the shading was installed and enjoyed by attendees last season. The Board is committed to ensuring and enjoyable experience for the baseball community.

Communication via social media is an important way we use to communicate and engage with the baseball community. We encourage everyone to engage with us in this way.

Baseball WA convened a town hall meeting, earlier this year, to discuss the promotion and development of the women's game. The meeting was well attended with great enthusiasm. Experiences were shared and many suggestions put forward. We look forward to future meetings and greater engagement from the women in the game.

Baseball's partnership with A Stitch in Time, to bolster mental health and wellbeing initiatives is heading into the second year. We will again host a Mental Health Round and involve clubs to supports initiatives to drive awareness and support wellbeing conversations.

Andy Kyle has joined Baseball WA in a local Performance Pathway role, while also participating in Baseball Australia's AIS Gen 32 program. The Gen 32 program—a prestigious two-year scholarship designed to cultivate high-performance coaches in preparation for the Olympics—presents Kyle with a golden opportunity to refine his coaching philosophies and play a pivotal role in shaping the future of Australian Baseball. Simultaneously, his new role with Baseball WA ensures he remains deeply involved in the development of local talent, mentoring the next generation through enhanced performance pathways.

As previously reported, the Board is working to ensure governance of the sport is undertaken to the highest possible standards. In addition to the Australian National Integrity Framework the Board is continuing to improve governance and update practises. Baseball WA, in partnership with Baseball Australia and Sport Integrity Australia, recently hosted a dedicated Child Safeguarding Workshop for our Rising Stars high performance athletes, their parents, and representatives from local clubs. Baseball WA continues to reinforce its commitment to the safety and wellbeing of all participants by engaging players, parents and clubs in such important conversations. These workshops are part of an ongoing effort to ensure that everyone involved in our sport understands their role in keeping young people safe both on and off the field.

There was increased participation during the 2024-25 season, with extra teams in both the senior and junior competitions. Improving participation pathways and opportunities is one of BWA's main areas of strategic focus. This includes working with Tee Ball Association of WA, schools and other organisations to generate grassroots interest and transition young players into baseball. Baseball WA is also working in regional WA to grow and develop the game.



Our teams have performed well at national championships. Congratulations to the Under 16's winning bronze at the National Championships, under 18's winning silver and Wanneroo for winning the 2025 Senior League Championship

We continue to work with the Perth Heat to support the growth of baseball in WA. The Perth Heat again qualified for the play-offs but ultimately fell short. Thank you to all who attended the Perth Heat games at the ballpark. As many of you are aware the previous owners stepped away. We thank for them for the support of the game during their tenure. We look forward to working with new ownership, The Black Pearl Sporting Group, to grow and develop the game.

As a not-for-profit community sporting association, Baseball WA's goal is to ensure we have sufficient funds to sustainably deliver our programs. The board has continued to focus on careful budgeting and financial management. We received continued financial and in-kind support from Healthway and the Department of Creative Industries, Tourism and Sport, Qbit, Belgravia Apparel, Diamond Fitness, Harcher, Sixteen 23, Fielders Choice, SportsLink Travel, and the City of Gosnells which we greatly appreciate. The Board continually explores additional funding sources to ensure the growth of the sport into the future.

I thank all our Board members for their contribution throughout the past year.

I wish to thank all clubs, players, officials, volunteers, the greater baseball community and my fellow board members, our chief executive Lachlan Dale and his small, dedicated team for their contribution to baseball in Western Australia.

CEO'S REPORT



Baseball Excellence

Baseball WA continues to set the benchmark for athlete development and competition across the country. Our High-Performance programs have grown significantly, with increased participation across both male and female pathways. Western Australian athletes represented more than 20% of national team rosters in the Women's, 18U, and 23U categories, with standout performances at the Under 18, 16s, Women's, and Youth Championships.

The implementation of the FTEM model continues to provide a clear and consistent framework for athletes, families, and coaches, guiding progression from grassroots to elite levels. Programs such as Rising Stars, Girls With Game, and State Team Development Squads are now fully aligned with the FTEM phases, ensuring targeted support and defined development pathways.

The Perth Heat's playoff run was another season highlight, showcasing the depth of WA talent on the national stage. We acknowledge and thank the previous ownership group for their support over the past eight years and warmly welcome Black Pearl Sports Group as the new owners. Baseball in WA continues to benefit from private investment that inspires our athletes and enhances the experience for fans and families alike.

Growth Through Engagement

Our reach continues to expand, with more than 90,000 participants engaged through school programs, club activations, and regional outreach. Campaigns such as #GirlsWithGame, Rising Stars, and Diamond Days have strengthened visibility, inclusion, and community pride.

The Inclusion Participation Program has grown significantly, providing tailored opportunities for athletes with disabilities, culturally diverse communities, and participants from regional and remote areas. This year, new inclusive clinics were launched across WA with support from local councils and CITS, reflecting our commitment to access and equity.

Through the Regional Servicing Grant, development officers were deployed across key hubs, delivering coaching clinics, umpire training, and club support. These efforts have contributed to a 12% increase in regional participation, with new junior teams established in the Goldfields, Pilbara, Wheatbelt, and South West regions.

Sustainability, Governance & Policy

Baseball WA continues to strengthen its governance framework and operational sustainability. In 2025, key updates were made to:

- Senior Competition Regulations (v2.1)
- State League Compliance Regulations
- Junior By-Laws (2025–2026)
- Tribunal Procedures (v3.2)
- National Integrity Framework Education Plan
- Inclusion Policy
- Travel Teams Policy
- Women's Advisory Panel

- Life Member Charter



Regular reviews of our risk register, complaints procedures, and strategic KPIs ensure transparency and accountability. The Board met 12 times this year, maintaining strong alignment with Baseball WA's strategic objectives. Financial performance remains stable, with audited accounts finalised by October 31 and the Annual General Meeting scheduled for November. All capital works were delivered within approved budgets and timelines.

Facilities

Over \$2.5 million was invested into baseball facilities across WA, supported by local councils, the State Government, and commercial partners. Key projects included lighting upgrades, turf replacement, and improved accessibility. The Statewide Facilities Plan continues to progress, with annual audits conducted through WA clubs to guide future investment. Baseball Park remains a premier venue for national and local competition, events, and community activities, continuing to evolve as the home of baseball in Western Australia.

Looking Ahead

As we look toward the 2025/26 season, our focus remains on:

- Increasing participation through grassroots connection and engagement
- Celebrating achievements and positive stories across the sport
- Elevating performance through FTEM-aligned development programs
- Expanding inclusive and regional opportunities
- Strengthening governance and financial sustainability
- Enhancing club environments, facilities, and gameday experiences

WA Rising Stars Program

In 2025, Baseball WA rebranded its performance pathways under the Rising Stars program, aligning with national talent models and athlete-centred development.

- **Performance Pathway (T3–T4):** 23 athletes selected
- **Development Program (T2–T3):** 30 athletes engaged

Program features included:

- Technical skill development and acquisition
- 2-3 days a week on-field for a 20 week block during the winter
- Test and retest data
- Use of technology such as Rapsdodo and Blast monitors
- Periodised programming and strength and conditioning support via Diamond Fitness
- A holistic, athlete-centred training environment

The program also served as a platform for coach development, inviting new and aspiring coaches to observe, engage, and learn alongside experienced staff.



Perth Heat – ABL Season

The Perth Heat delivered another strong season, advancing to the ABL Championship Series:

- Defeated reigning champions Adelaide Giants in the semi-finals
- Narrowly missed the title against a high-performing Canberra squad in the final

PARTICIPATION PROGRAMS

The Baseball WA Participation Department's strategic focus for the 2024-25 period is firmly aligned with its overarching mission to foster growth, inclusivity, and development across all levels of baseball and tee-ball in Western Australia. This report provides a comprehensive overview of the programs, events, and initiatives undertaken during this period, highlighting their contribution to established strategic themes.

Key priorities included expanding female participation, deepening regional engagement, enhancing coach development, and broadening inclusive opportunities for individuals of all abilities. The department has successfully translated aspirational goals into tangible, funded programs, demonstrating robust organisational foresight and execution capabilities. Strategic partnerships have played a vital role in extending reach and securing critical resources, underscoring a diversified approach to growth.

While significant progress has been made, certain areas require further detailed documentation to ensure complete transparency and facilitate future evaluation. The department is well-positioned for continued expansion, driven by a clear strategic framework and a proactive approach to program delivery and innovation.

Strategic Framework: Participation Themes & Objectives

The foundation of Baseball WA's participation efforts is built upon a clear set of strategic themes and objectives. These themes guide the department's initiatives, ensuring a cohesive and purposeful approach to sport development and community engagement.

Core Participation Themes and Objectives

- **Little League:** The overarching goal is to "provide the best possible member experience and foster a pathway of transition from tee-ball utilising machine pitch. Taking advantage of appropriate tournament pathway options". This theme underscores a commitment to player experience and a structured progression through the sport.
- **Tee-ball:** The objective is to "drive new players into tee-ball at the entry level. Support a pathway from tee-ball to adult". This highlights the importance of entry-level recruitment and long-term player retention within the baseball ecosystem.
- **Female Participation:** The presence of this theme signals a dedicated commitment to increasing female involvement across all facets of the sport. Subsequent initiatives detailed in this report demonstrate the concrete actions taken to advance this area.
- **Schools:** This theme aims to "maximise the number of schools participating in the Sporting Schools program. Develop and facilitate inter-school tee-ball and baseball competition". The focus here is on leveraging educational institutions as key avenues for growth and participation.
- **Regional:** The objective is to "drive regional association development to expand pathways (i.e., tee-ball into baseball). Expand our reach by partnering with regional service delivery

organisations". This emphasises geographical expansion and the cultivation of local partnerships to broaden the sport's footprint.



- **Engagement:** This theme encompasses a multi-faceted approach, with goals to "develop new programs and/or take advantage of opportunities to provide value-add experiences to our existing membership. Develop programs to increase the number of quality coaches. Be an active partner to Baseball Australia in delivering on the outcomes of the National Participation Plan". It covers enhancing membership value, investing in coach development, and aligning with national strategic objectives.
- **Inclusion:** The objective is to "drive the evolution of providing opportunities for people of all abilities to be welcomed members, players and volunteers". This theme champions accessibility and diversity, striving to create an environment where everyone can participate, regardless of ability.



2024-25 Programs, Events, and Initiatives: Comprehensive Overview

The 2024-25 period marks a significant phase for Baseball WA's Participation Department, characterised by a diverse portfolio of programs, events, and initiatives designed to foster growth and engagement across all levels of the sport. Many items listed for 2024-25, such as the expansion of the Challenger program, the Unisport initiative, and the Regional Servicing Grant, were part of previous future planning or work in progress initiatives.

The following table offers a high-level snapshot of the entire participation calendar for 2024-25, organised by Baseball WA's core strategic themes. This quick reference guide allows stakeholders to grasp the scope of planned activities at a glance.

Detailed Analysis of 2024-25 Programs and Events by Strategic Theme

This section provides an in-depth elaboration for each program, event, and initiative listed for the 2024-25 period, categorised by Baseball WA's core participation themes.

A. Little League Programs

LLSC

The LLSC, or Little League State Championship, is a pivotal event that incorporates all four age divisions of Little League Baseball. This championship serves as a crucial step on the international



tournament pathway for young athletes. It aims to foster competitive spirit and skill development among young athletes, providing a structured progression within the Little League framework. The dates for the 2025 State Championships were: Little League (LL) from April 17-21, Intermediate League (IL) from April 17-21, Junior League (JL) from April 11-16, and Senior League (SL) from April 11-16. The Little League and Intermediate League championships were held at Kingsway Reserve (Wanneroo Giants), while the Junior League and Senior League championships will take place at Empire Ball Park, Thornlie.

Cavaliers

Cavaliers offers a way for all players who do not get picked in a tournament team to still play in the Little League Development Shield. This provides an additional opportunity for engagement and continued play within the Little League framework. The Cavaliers program was held during the Little League State Championship dates, from April 17-21.

Development Shield: Machine Pitch (DS: MP)

DS: MP refers to Development Shield: Machine Pitch. Both Development Shield and Machine Pitch are additional divisions played at the Little League State Championship, providing more opportunities for players to participate. It is important to note that these divisions are distinct from the international tournament pathway divisions. These divisions were also held during the Little League State Championship dates, from April 17-21.

LL ITP Nationals x 4

There are four distinct Little League International Tournament Pathway (ITP) national championships that occur after state events and provide a pathway to World Series tournaments in the United States. These tournaments are for Australian junior baseball teams across various Little League age groups, emphasising development, discipline, teamwork, and fair play.

The four national championships were:

- **Senior League National Championships:** For age group 13-16, scheduled from Wednesday, May 21 – Sunday, May 25, in Geelong, Victoria. The winner advances to the World Series in Easley, South Carolina.
- **Junior League National Championships:** For age group 12-14, scheduled from Wednesday, May 28 – Sunday, June 1, on the Gold Coast. The winner advances to the World Series in Livermore, California.
- **Intermediate League National Championships:** For age group 11-13, scheduled from Wednesday, May 28 – Sunday, June 1, with locations including Gold Coast, Lismore, or Melbourne. The winner advances to the World Series in Livermore, California.
- **Little League National Championships:** For age group 10-12, scheduled from Sunday, June 8 – Friday, June 13, 2025, in Blacktown, NSW. The winner advances to the World Series in Williamsport, Pennsylvania.

These national championships are a culmination of local league play and offer participants opportunities for travel, making new friends, and engaging in friendly competition.

LL Invitational (Development Shield)

The Little League Invitational is a national tournament that provides competitive pathways for Little League players. It is scheduled for July 8-12, 2025, and will take place at Redcliffe Baseball Club in Queensland. This tournament aims to foster competitive spirit and skill development among young athletes.



B. Tee-ball Programs

LLTB (7–10 Jul) Tee Ball Camp

The LLTB (Little League Tee Ball) Camp is scheduled for July 7-10, 2025, at Baseball Park.² This camp aims to provide a fun and active experience for young participants, allowing them to make new friends while developing their skills. The camp is structured with different session times based on age: children up to 6 years old attend from 9 AM to 11 AM, and children up to 8 years old attend from 11 AM to 2 PM.

October School Holiday Tee-Ball Camps

Baseball WA, in partnership with the Tee-Ball Association of WA (TBWA) and the "Think Again" initiative, offers school holiday tee-ball camps at various locations. The October 2024 camps were held at Empire Ballpark and Lighting Park (home of Morley Eagles Tee-Ball Club). These camps provide skill-building activities focusing on hitting, throwing, catching, fielding, and base running, with a fun game to end each day. There were multiple options for two age groups: up to 8 years old and 9 years old+.

Little League T-Ball Club Programs

Little League T-Ball is an introductory tee-ball program aimed at kids aged 4-8 years old. Its primary aim is to provide an opportunity for children to build the fine and gross motor skills necessary for a lifetime of enjoyment in baseball. The program is designed to be simple to deliver, with all resources provided to clubs and associations, making it accessible to everyone. It can be run as a term program or as holiday clinics, with the Kiddo program recommended for 4–6-year-olds and the Little League T-Ball program for 6-8 year olds. This program is offered annually throughout the year, with flexibility for individual deliverers on how it is run.

Clubs will be familiar with Aussie T-ball, which Little League T-Ball is replacing and we hope all clubs will take up the options to run this for their entry level membership.

C. Female Participation Initiatives

MP Girls Summer Classic

The MP Girls Summer Classic is an annual Machine Pitch Summer Classic specifically designed for girls who are currently playing tee-ball, baseball, or softball, as well as those entirely new to the sport. The primary objective of this event is to provide an engaging and developmental opportunity for girls aged up to 14 years old (as at August 31, 2025) to experience tournament-style gameplay and enhance their skills in a supportive environment. It is particularly beneficial for regional players, tee-ballers looking to transition into baseball, and metropolitan players seeking additional gameplay and tournament exposure.



LL Girls

The LL Girls program refers to the Little League Girls Division, which is part of national tournaments providing competitive pathways for League Age 9-12 year old girls. These tournaments are hosted in Redcliffe from July 8-12, 2025.



Barclay Cup (28 Sep - 4 Oct)

The Barclay Cup is an annual tournament established in honour of Jacinda Barclay, a distinguished West Australian sportswoman who passed away in 2020. The purpose of this competition is to provide a high-level competitive opportunity for female baseball players, thereby fostering elite development and preserving Jacinda Barclay's legacy. For the 2024 tournament, Baseball WA sent two West Coast Rays teams, named Blue and Gold, to compete in the event held in Sydney.

Girls With Game (New Program 5 Aug - 28 Sep)

The "Girls with Game: Level Up Academy" is an all-female baseball development program offered by Baseball WA. Its primary objectives are to sharpen skills, build confidence, and elevate the baseball IQ of female athletes, catering to those aspiring for state selection as well as those who simply enjoy the game. The program is structured as an 8-week training initiative, featuring two sessions per week: one on a weeknight and one on the weekend. It includes expert coaching delivered in a motivating and inclusive environment, a training uniform, and performance testing at both the commencement and conclusion of the program. This program, alongside the Barclay Cup, signifies a multi-tiered approach to female participation, moving beyond general recruitment to dedicated skill and talent development. The inclusion of performance testing further underscores its focus on measurable improvement and pathway progression.

Natasha Bakranich All Girls Carnival

The Natasha Bakranich All Girls Carnival was inaugurated in 2021 by Huntingdale Teeball Club. This event was created in response to an observed decline in female participation around the age of 10, when the sport often becomes male-dominated. The primary purpose of the carnival is to encourage girls to remain in baseball by providing an exclusive event where they can play with other girls their own age, celebrate their skills and abilities, and most importantly, have fun. Baseball WA is invited to attend this event each year and provides all the participating girls with club information, baseball merchandise and other information to encourage them to progress on their journey into female baseball. This represents a significant financial investment for Baseball WA.

D. Schools Programs

Unisport

The Unisport initiative is a new University Varsity Competition designed to foster the growth of baseball in Western Australia. The primary objective is to establish a new UniSport Baseball competition, leveraging universities to expand participation and create novel pathways for engagement within the sport. The initiative involves launching new steering committees at local universities and plans to offer options for both midweek or weekend games during the winter

season. The target audience includes students from various Western Australian universities, including UWA, Curtin, Edith Cowan, Murdoch, and Notre Dame.



School Championships: Tee-Ball 29 Oct, Primary School MP 5 Nov, Secondary School MP 12 Nov, Schools Open 27 Aug

Baseball WA organises Interschool Baseball and Tee-Ball tournaments, collectively known as the School Championships. The core objective is to provide an exciting opportunity for students to engage in baseball, enjoying an action-packed day of physical activity and competition. These are one-day events held at Baseball Park, Thornlie. The Machine Pitch (MP) events utilise the MP70 format, which involves machine pitch played on a 70-foot diamond, mirroring the size used in Intermediate League. Each diamond used during the events is staffed by Baseball WA personnel responsible for machine operation and umpiring, and each event is designed to accommodate 8 teams. The target audience is segmented by age and format: Open Baseball for Year 7-12 students, Year 4, 5, 6 Tee-Ball, Year 4, 5, 6 Machine Pitch, and Year 7/8 Machine Pitch. The specific dates for these events are: Open Baseball (Year 7-12) on August 27, Year 4, 5, 6 Tee-Ball on October 29, Year 4, 5, 6 Machine Pitch on November 5, and Year 7/8 Machine Pitch on November 12, all at Baseball Park, Thornlie.

Sporting Schools

The Sporting Schools program is a significant Australian Government initiative, supported by \$240 million in funding, aimed at increasing children's participation in sport and connecting them with community sporting opportunities. The program's core purpose is to help students build the confidence and capability necessary to remain active throughout their lives, providing free programs to children and their families. Sport Australia has partnered with over 30 national sporting organisations (NSOs), including Baseball WA, to deliver this program. The program offers two main streams: a general program for primary schools and a targeted program for Year 7 and 8 students in secondary schools. Baseball WA actively promotes and delivers Sporting Schools activities.

E. Regional Initiatives

Stephen Michael Foundation & Ngurra Kujungka Regional Tee-Ball Outreach

Baseball WA collaborates with the Stephen Michael Foundation (SMF) and Ngurra Kujungka to deliver community programs, specifically tee-ball activities, in regional and remote areas. These partnerships aim to encourage positive community engagement and participation, develop healthier individuals, and provide opportunities for youth in socially disadvantaged and disengaged communities. Baseball WA staff travel with SMF and Ngurra Kujungka staff to various locations to deliver these tee-ball activities.

Specific events and visits under this initiative include:

- **Stephen Michael Foundation Inservice:** These are training sessions with the staff of SMF.
- **SMF N. Goldfields Carnival (June 23–26):** A carnival held in the Northern Goldfields region in collaboration with SMF.
- **SMF N. Goldfields (August 18–21):** Further engagement in Northern Goldfields with SMF.

- **SMF Murchison (September 8–12):** Regional outreach in the Murchison area with SMF.
- **Ngurra Kujungka/Western Desert (September 17–19):** Community programs delivered in the Western Desert region in partnership with Ngurra Kujungka.
- **Goldfields-Esperance Carnival (September 27–29):** A carnival promoting participation in the Goldfields-Esperance region.



NW Champs MP70 (19–21 Sep)

The Machine Pitch (MP70) event is set to return to the Northwest Championship in 2025, hosted by Exmouth from September 19-21. This event offers an exciting opportunity for players who have aged out of tee-ball to continue their baseball journey with a moving ball experience. This initiative aims to enhance participation across the region, ensuring that young athletes have an accessible pathway to skill development and competitive play. In addition to the MP70 event, Baseball WA will host a "Coach the Coaches" workshop, welcoming tee-ball and baseball coaches from across the Northwest. This session is designed to equip coaches with new strategies, techniques, and insights to better support player growth. Players will register as individuals and be placed into teams for the event, though towns interested in forming their own teams are welcome to do so. The event is open to any player who has not turned 15 years old at the start of the event.

Nightfields

The Nightfields program is a multi-sport-based activity delivered to at-risk, socially disadvantaged, and disengaged youth aged 6-18 in after-school hours. Its primary aim is to encourage positive community engagement and participation, develop healthier individuals, and reduce anti-social behaviour. The program is run in consultation with various partners, including WA police, various Local Governments and Shires, and a broad range of local service providers who assist in program planning, promotions, and engaging with participants. At each Nightfields session, participants receive free food following their involvement in all sporting activities. Baseball WA travels with Stephen Michael Foundation (SMF) staff to various locations and dates to deliver tee-ball activity as part of this program.

Regional Servicing Grant

The Regional Servicing Grant is an approved funding stream through DLGSC dedicated to supporting regional development and servicing initiatives. The primary objective of this grant is to drive regional association development and expand Baseball WA's reach by fostering partnerships with regional service delivery organisations. The key activities facilitated by this grant include providing funding for regional initiatives, notably enabling the hiring of "boots on the ground" staff. The target audience encompasses regional associations, clubs, and communities across Western Australia. This grant was approved for during the 2024-25 period as an on-going funding source.

Regional Servicing Officers

Overview of Regional Focus and New Staff

The primary objective of this initiative is to expand Baseball WA's reach and provide direct support for regional association development, thereby fostering pathways from tee-ball into baseball across regional areas. Key activities involve a direct physical presence and dedicated support in

designated regional areas, with a target audience covering regional associations, clubs, and communities. Appointed officers include Mark Pierson for Goldfields-Esperance, Matt Froude and Josh Morris for Pilbara-Gascoyne, and Beyanka Girdlestone for Southwest-Peel. The Mid-West role remains vacant.



F. Engagement Programs

Holiday Camps (HBF Stadium, Murdoch, Curtin, ECU Joondalup)

Baseball WA conducts various school holiday camps at locations including HBF Stadium, Murdoch, Curtin, and ECU Joondalup. These camps aim to provide fun, skill-building activities for children during school breaks, covering fundamental skills such as hitting, throwing, catching, fielding, and base running, often culminating in a game at the end of each day. The target audience comprises children, typically of primary school age, interested in Tee-Ball. The camps are often run in partnership with the Tee-Ball Association of WA (TBAWA) and are associated with the Think Again initiative. These ongoing activities contribute to engagement by offering value-add experiences to existing and potential members.



Multi Sport Armadale

The Multi Sport Armadale program, titled "Multi-Sport Summer Edition," is a free multi-sport activity designed to connect participants with local clubs and encourage them to try new sports, including cricket, baseball, and more. It ran every Friday from August 30 to September 20, from 4:30 PM to 5:30 PM, at Novelli Reserve in Piara Waters. The program is suitable for anyone aged 5-17 and provides free fresh fruit and water. It is organised in partnership with the City of Armadale.

Game Plan

"Game Plan" is a valuable resource or tool specifically designed to assist local baseball clubs with

their planning efforts. Its core objective is to support and enhance local club planning and development, an online portal that guides clubs through self-assessment and strategic planning. This initiative is ongoing and is delivered in partnership with the Australian Sports Commission and various state and territory government sport sector partners.



Coaching and Education (Canopi)

The "Coaching and Education (Canopi)" initiative focuses on developing programs to increase the number and quality of coaches, which is a key part of the "Engagement" theme. A significant component of this utilising Baseball Australia's online system named Canopi, that facilitates the empowerment of coaches to train other coaches. The primary objective of this initiative is to provide a robust online platform for coach education and development, thereby enabling a peer-to-peer coaching mentorship model. The key activity involved finalising and launching this online system, which occurred in late 2024. The target audience for this platform is coaches, with the ultimate goal of equipping them to effectively train and mentor other coaches. We obtained a grant from DLGSC to facilitate this project.

Coaches completing modules within Canopi achieve accreditation under Baseball Australia's National Coaching Accreditation Scheme (NCAS) as Levels A, B & C.

It includes the establishment of an on-going mentor platform to provide on-going support to all accredited coaches which is due to launch in August 2025.

H. Inclusion Initiatives

Challenger

Challenger is a Little League program designed to provide opportunities for individuals with neurological, physical, and/or intellectual disabilities to participate in baseball within an environment specifically structured to their abilities. "Have a Go Days" serves as a crucial initial step to gauge interest and feasibility for a subsequent pilot program.

The existing Challenger Baseball program caters to children aged 4-18 years. The new Senior Challenger Division extends this opportunity to adults of all ages with physical and/or intellectual disabilities. The "Have a Go Day" session for the Senior Challenger Division was held on Saturday, May 24, from 9:00 AM to 10:30 AM at Wanneroo Giants Baseball Club.

Reclink

Reclink Australia provides and promotes over 10,000 sport, recreation, and arts sessions each year to individuals from disadvantaged backgrounds. These programs are designed to provide positive health outcomes for the more than 160,000 people who participate. Reclink works with various key stakeholders in the community, including Baseball WA, to deliver programs that meet community needs, aiming to offer affordable and accessible activities daily. In addition to daily community sport, recreation, and arts opportunities, Reclink also supports individuals in participating in mainstream clubs and associations within their local community.

Inclusive Participation Grant

The Inclusive Participation Grant is an approved funding stream from DLGSC specifically designed to support initiatives that promote inclusive participation within baseball. Its core objective is to drive the evolution of providing opportunities for people of all abilities to be welcomed as members, players, and volunteers within the sport. The grant provides funding for various projects aimed at fostering inclusion. The target audience includes individuals of all abilities, as well as clubs and volunteers committed to creating inclusive environments. This grant was approved for three years commencing in the 2024-25 period.

Specifically, the funding aims to (1) expand the existing program at Wanneroo to include an Adult program, (2) create a new Challenger program in the Kalamunda/Swan Hills region, (3) create a new Challenger program in the Peel/Coastal Bay region and (4) develop a new All-Abilities Tee-ball program (Kiddo).

V. Key Partnerships and Collaborations

Strategic partnerships are fundamental to achieving Baseball WA's participation goals, extending the organisation's reach, and enhancing its capacity. The department benefits from a robust and diversified portfolio of collaborations, drawing strength from various entities.

Strategic Partners and Their Contributions

- **Healthway & Think Again®:** Healthway is a significant financial contributor to the Participation Department.
- **Stephen Michael Foundation (SMF) & Ngurra Kujungka:** These organisations are key collaborators in regional visits and specific initiatives such as Nightfields, Northern Goldfields, and NK Western Desert, fostering engagement in remote communities.
- **Sporting Schools & Sport Australia:** As an Australian Government initiative, Sporting Schools is strategically leveraged to deliver school-based participation programs, including Tee Ball, Machine Pitch, and Baseball5, reaching a broad youth demographic.
- **Little League (International & WA):** This partnership is central to junior pathways, providing governance frameworks and facilitating participation in national and international tournaments.
- **Tee-Ball Association of WA (TBAWA):** An ongoing collaboration through a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) supports tee-ball development and pathways.
- **Inclusion Solutions & WADSA:** These new partners are vital for inclusion initiatives, particularly in supporting the Challenger program and raising awareness for social inclusion and disability within the sport.
- **KIDDO:** A new partner network that supports school and regional initiatives, expanding the reach of participation programs.
- **Baseball Australia (BA):** Collaboration with the national body extends to future development plans, alignment with the National Participation Plan, and participation in national tournaments such as the Little League Girls Championships.
- **Belgravia-Apparel (BA):** As the official uniform supplier and sponsor for the Barclay Cup, Belgravia-Apparel not only provides high-quality apparel but also advocates for the growth of



the female game and positive mental health.

- **UniSport Australia:** This organisation provides crucial guidance for the establishment of the new University Varsity Competition, expanding baseball's presence into tertiary education.
- **Wanneroo Giants Baseball Club:** This club serves as a key host for the existing Challenger Baseball programs, providing facilities and local support.



Approved Grants and Their Impact

- **Play Well National Grant:** This grant has been APPROVED. It is specifically supporting the creation of Little League T-Ball as the redesign of Aussie T-ball.
- **Regional Servicing Grant:** This grant has also been APPROVED. It directly enables the crucial delivery of a regional presence and support for local associations and communities.
- **Coaching & Officials Grant:** APPROVED. This funding is allocated to support the development of practical course content for coaching certifications (Cert B & C) and, critically, the finalisation and launch of the Canopi online system. This system is designed to empower coaches to train other coaches, fostering a scalable and self-sustaining coaching ecosystem.
- **Inclusive Participation Grant:** This grant has been APPROVED. Its purpose is to support the expansion of the Challenger program to include Challenger Tee-ball and the development of Adult Challenger programs. Furthermore, it aims to facilitate the creation of more inclusive club environments across the sport.

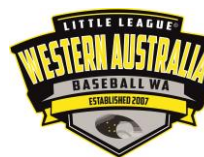
Strategic Outlook for the Participation Department

Registration System for Clubs & Charters

After a period of adjustment and troubleshooting, the GameDay database now appears to have stabilized significantly. Clubs have successfully settled into the system, and many of the earlier issues, ranging from login difficulties to data syncing errors, have been resolved. The platform is running more smoothly, with improved reliability and performance across key functions.

While there may still be occasional hiccups, the overall experience has become more consistent, allowing clubs to focus more on their operations and less on technical disruptions. Continued monitoring and minor updates are expected to ensure the system remains robust and responsive to user needs.

Use of GameChanger to Score Games

GameChanger is now making its way into the Little League grades, with a full rollout expected by 2026-2027 season. This marks an exciting step forward in streamlining scoring and game management across all levels of competition.

The platform has already proven its value at higher levels, and its introduction to Little League is helping scorers become more confident and experienced, especially as they prepare for major events like the State Championships. With its user-friendly interface and real-time scoring features, GameChanger is making it easier for volunteers and officials to stay on top of the game.

As more clubs adopt the system, we anticipate smoother operations and better data consistency across competitions. The future looks bright for Little League with GameChanger fully in play.

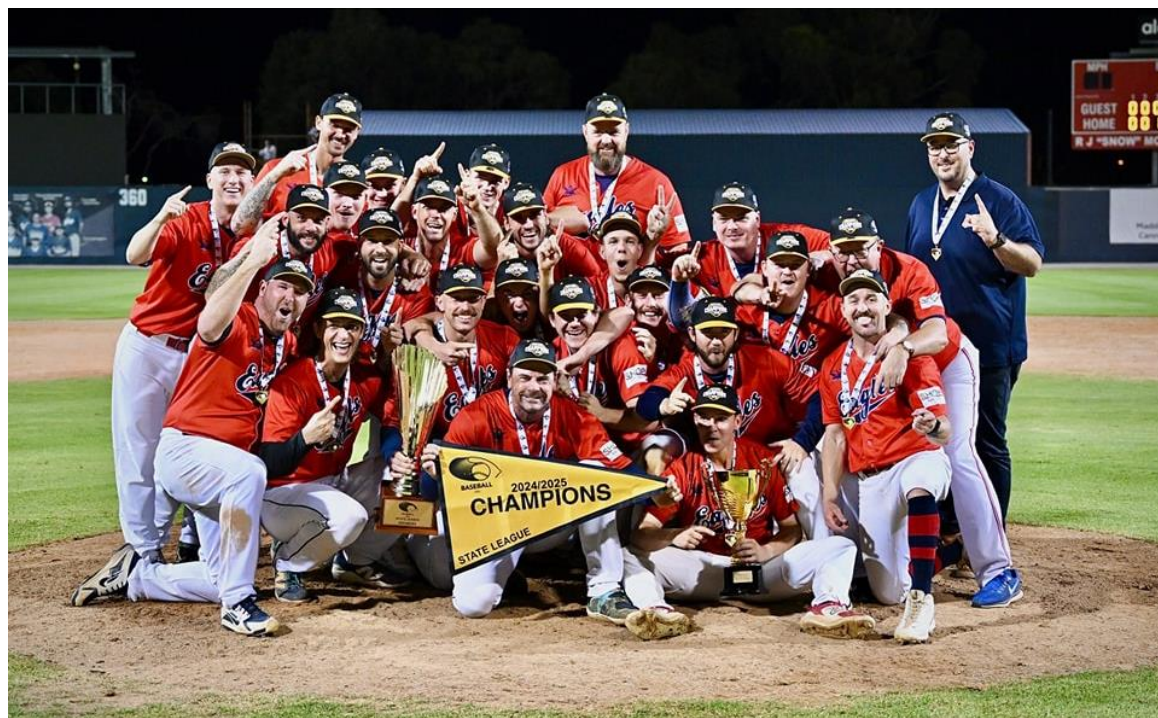

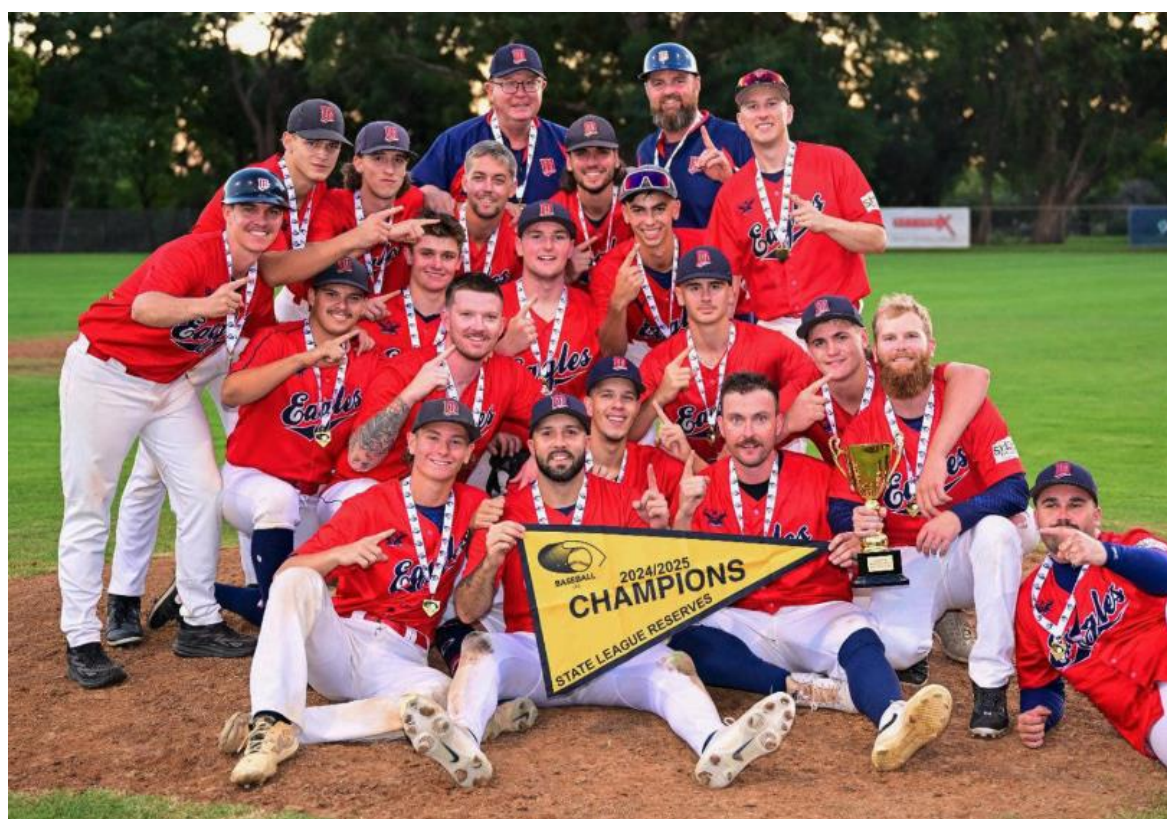
Closing Remarks

BASEBALL WA MUSEUM & ARCHIVES



In April 2025, structural engineers officially signed off on the new Museum extension, confirming it meets all required standards. This followed two previous assessments in late 2024 and early 2025.

We're thrilled to share that, as of June, the extension has now been fully converted into an additional display space for our growing collection. Construction began in October 2024 and was largely completed by a small but dedicated team of museum volunteers. Working under professional guidance, they committed around three hours each week—learning new skills along the way. Their passion and effort were key to the success of this project.

Thanks to the generosity of our baseball community, nearly \$50,000 was raised to help bring this project to life. With this new space now open, the Baseball WA Museum continues to set the benchmark across Australia and the southern hemisphere for preserving and celebrating the history of our game.

Sharing Baseball's Story Beyond Our Walls

June welcomed a number of special visitors to the Museum, including six representatives from the City of Belmont Museum. Belmont will soon launch a year-long sports exhibition, featuring six months of summer sports followed by six months of winter sports. We are currently working with them on a loan agreement to showcase WA baseball memorabilia as part of this project.

We were also proud to host the newly elected State Member for Thornlie, the Hon. Colleen Egan, accompanied by our Museum Patron, Ms Pat Morris AM. During her visit, Colleen kindly assisted with signing a baseball for recent Baseball WA Hall of Fame inductee, Murray Westphal.

Recognition on the National Stage

June also marked a milestone, with Perth hosting the Australian & New Zealand Museums of Sport Conference for the first time. Delegates toured several leading sporting museums—and we're pleased to report the Baseball WA Museum was extremely well received as a standout success story.

Growing the Collection & Preserving Our History

Our team continues to catalogue, preserve and record WA's baseball history with care and precision. Each item entered into the collection is photographed, measured, described, assessed for significance, and given a unique accession number. As at the end of June, 684 items are now recorded on the Collections WA platform.

Our oral history program is also progressing well, with the number of recorded interviews now at 17. Sadly, five of the interviewees have passed away since sharing their stories, reminding us how important it is to capture and preserve these memories before they are lost. Their voices, experiences, and contributions to the game are now safeguarded for generations to come



Looking Ahead

There is growing recognition of the Museum's role in preserving local history, and we believe our evolving collection deserves to be formally acknowledged as part of the cultural heritage of our community. We look forward to exploring opportunities to enhance this recognition in the future. Thank you to everyone—members, volunteers, donors, and supporters—who continue to help protect the rich history of baseball in Western Australia.



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 30 JUNE 2025

The financial statements cover Baseball WA Limited as an individual entity. Baseball WA Limited is a not for profit company limited by shares incorporated under the Corporations Act 2001.

The functional and presentation currency of Baseball WA Limited is Australian dollars. Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

1 Basis of Preparation

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Corporations Act 2001. The Board has determined that the company is not a reporting entity.

In the opinion of the Board of Directors, the company is not a reporting entity since there are unlikely to exist users of the financial report who are not able to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy specifically all of their information needs. These special purpose financial statements have been prepared to meet the reporting requirements of the Act.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the mandatory Australian Accounting Standards applicable to companies reporting under the Corporations Act. The company has complied with the recognition and measurement criteria of Australian Accounting Standards.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and are consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

The following material accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

2 Summary of Material Accounting Policies

Going Concern

The financial report has been prepared on a going concern basis, which contemplates the continuity of normal business activity and the realisation of assets and settlement of liabilities in the normal course of business. The Directors have budgeted an operating surplus for the year ended 30 June 2026 and as noted in Note 16, have no reason to believe the various government agencies will not continue to support Baseball WA Limited. Based upon this the Directors are of the opinion the going concern basis is appropriate.

Property, plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Plant and Equipment

Plant and equipment and leasehold improvements (including baseball park) are measured on the cost basis and therefore carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment. In the event that the carrying amount of plant and equipment is greater than the estimated recoverable amount, the carrying amount is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount and impairment losses are recognised either in profit or loss or as a revaluation decrease if the impairment losses relate to a revalued asset. An assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are recognised as expenses in profit or loss during the financial period in which they are incurred.

Depreciation

Plant and equipment is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the asset's useful life to the Company, commencing when the asset is ready for use. At the end of each annual reporting period, the depreciation method, useful life and residual value of each asset is reviewed. Any revisions are accounted for prospectively as a change in estimates.

Fair Value of Assets

The Company measures some of its assets at fair value. Fair value is the price the Company would receive to sell an asset in an orderly (i.e.unforced) transaction between independent, knowledgeable and willing market participants at the measurement date.

Financial Instruments

Financial instruments are recognised initially using trade date accounting, i.e. on the date that the company becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

On initial recognition, all financial instruments are measured at fair value plus transaction costs (except for instruments measured at fair value through profit or loss where transaction costs are expensed as incurred).

Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. They arise principally through the provision of goods and services to customers but also incorporate other types of contractual monetary assets.

After initial recognition these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment. Any change in their value is recognised in profit or loss.

The company's trade and most other receivables fall into this category of financial instruments. Discounting is omitted where the effect of discounting is considered immaterial.

Material receivables are considered for impairment on an individual asset basis when they are past due at the reporting date or when objective evidence is received that a specific counterparty will default.

The amount of the impairment is the difference between the net carrying amount and the present value of the future expected cash flows associated with the impaired receivable.

For trade receivables, impairment provisions are recorded in a separate allowance account with the loss being recognised in profit or loss. When confirmation has been received that the amount is not collectable, the gross carrying value of the asset is written off against the associated impairment provision.

Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off are credited against other expenses in profit or loss.

In some circumstances, the company renegotiates repayment terms with customers which may lead to changes in the timing of the payments, the Company does not necessarily consider the balance to be impaired, however assessment is made on a case-by-case basis.

Available-for-sale financial assets

Available-for-sale financial assets are non-derivative financial assets that do not qualify for inclusion in any of the other categories of financial assets.

Purchases and sales of available-for-sale investments are recognised on settlement date.

Available-for-sale financial assets are measured at fair value, with subsequent changes in value recognised in other comprehensive income.

Gains and losses arising from financial instruments classified as available-for-sale are only recognised in profit or loss when they are sold or when the investment is impaired.

In the case of impairment or sale, any gain or loss previously recognised in equity is transferred to the profit or loss.

Losses recognised in prior period income statements resulting from the impairment of debt securities are reversed through the income statements, if the subsequent increase can be objectively related to an event occurring after the impairment loss was recognised in profit or loss.

Impairment of Non-Financial Assets

At the end of each reporting period the Company determines whether there is an evidence of an impairment indicator for non-financial assets.

Where this indicator exists and regardless for goodwill, indefinite life intangible assets and intangible assets not yet available for use, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated.

Where assets do not operate independently of other assets, the recoverable amount of the relevant cash-generating unit (CGU) is estimated.

The recoverable amount of an asset or CGU is the higher of the fair value less costs of disposal and the value in use. Value in use is the present value of the future cash flows expected to be derived from an asset or cash-generating unit.

Where the recoverable amount is less than the carrying amount, an impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss.

Reversal indicators are considered in subsequent periods for all assets which have suffered an impairment loss except for goodwill.

Accounts Receivable and Other Receivables

Accounts receivable are recognised initially at the transaction price (i.e. cost) and are subsequently measured at cost less provision for impairment. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

At the end of each reporting period, the carrying amount of accounts receivable and other receivables are reviewed to determine whether there is any objective evidence that the amounts are not recoverable. If so, an impairment loss is recognised immediately in income and expenditure statement.

Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the company's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be wholly settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Employee benefits expected to be settled more than one year after the end of the reporting period have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits. In determining the liability, consideration is given to employee wage increases and the probability that the employee may satisfy vesting requirements. Cashflows are discounted using market yields on high quality corporate bond rates incorporating bonds rated AAA or AA by credit agencies, with terms to maturity that match the expected timing of cash flows. Changes in the measurement of the liability are recognised in profit or loss.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the company has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an immaterial risk of change in value.

Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably, it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the Company and specific criteria relating to the type of revenue as noted below, has been satisfied.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and is presented net of returns, discounts and rebates.

Rental income

Investment property revenue is recognised on a straight-line basis over the period of the lease term so as to reflect a constant periodic rate of return on the net investment.

Interest revenue

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method.

Grant revenue

A number of programs are supported by grants received from the federal, state and local governments.

Grant revenue that is not subject to conditions is recognised when control of the funds is obtained, economic benefits are probable and the amount can be reliably measured. If conditions are attached to a grant which must be satisfied before the Company is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue is deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

Dividend revenue

Dividends are recognised when the right to receive payment is established.

Rendering of services

Revenue in relation to rendering of services is recognised depending on whether the outcome of the services can be estimated reliably. If the outcome can be estimated reliably then the stage of completion of the services is used to determine the appropriate level of revenue to be recognised in the period. If the outcome cannot be reliably estimated then revenue is recognised to the extent of expenses recognised that are recoverable.

Revenue from training services is generally recognised once the training has been delivered.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of GST.

Cash flows in the cash flow statement are included on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

Comparative Amounts

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

Where a change in comparatives has also affected the opening retained earnings previously presented in a comparative period, an opening statement of financial position at the earliest date of the comparative period has been presented.

Contingencies

Contingent liabilities and assets are not recognised in the balance sheet but are reported in the relevant schedules and notes. They may arise from uncertainty as to the existence of a liability or asset or represent an asset or liability in respect of which the amount cannot be reliably measured. Contingent assets are disclosed when settlement is probable but not virtually certain, and contingent liabilities are disclosed when settlement is greater than remote.

New and Amended Standards adopted by the Company

The company has adopted all the mandatory amendments to Australian Accounting Standards issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board. None of the mandatory amendments have had a material impact on the company.

Accounting Standards issued but not yet effect and not early adopted by the Company

The Company has not early adopted and amendments to Accounting Standards and does not anticipate application of new accounting standards will impact the company.

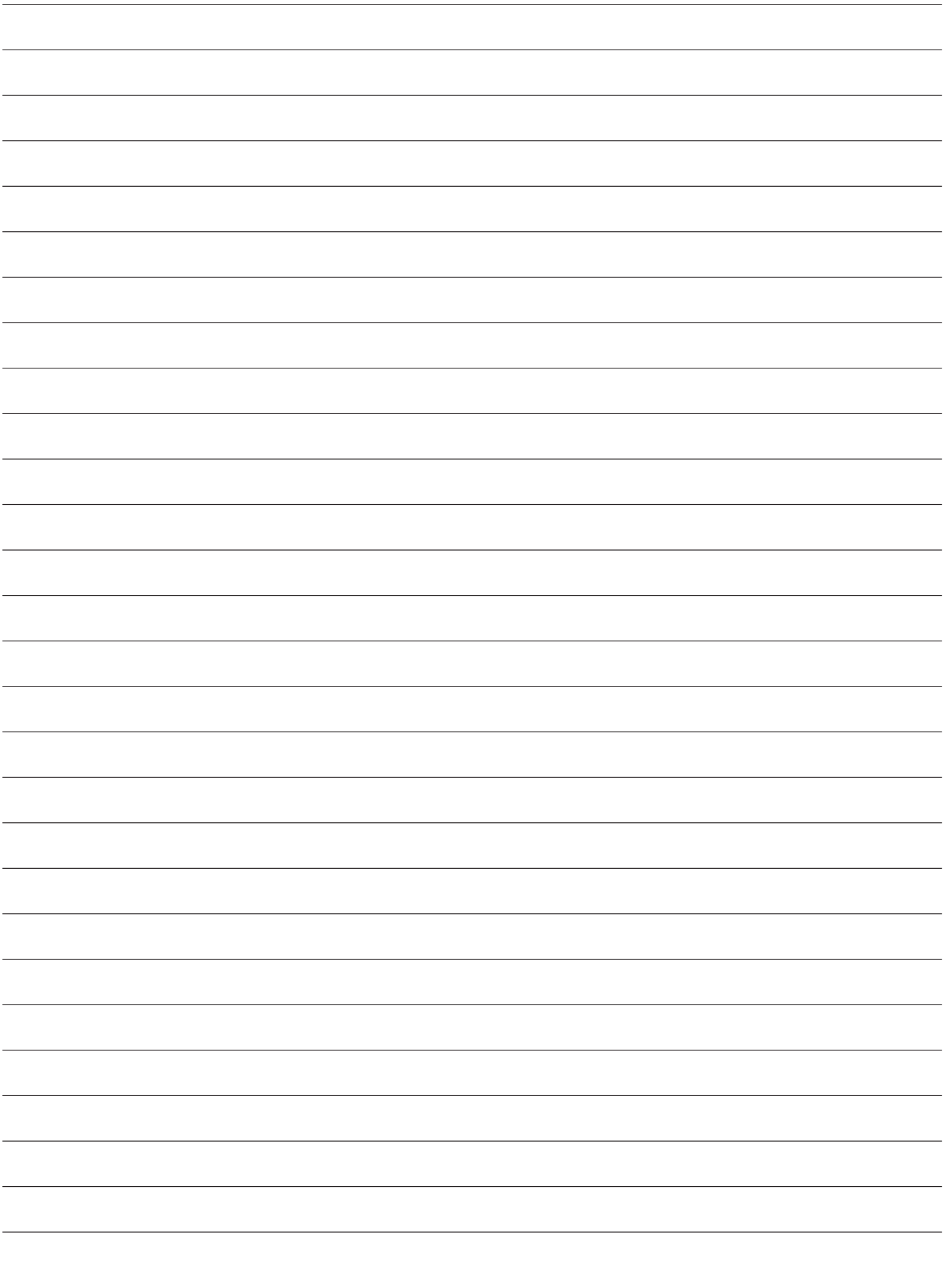
